# The Performativity of the State in China's Land Transformation

#### **ABSTRACT**

China urban studies literature has depicted in detail the concerns of and strategies for state-led and land-based accumulation. Besides the pivotal role of the state, we are also reminded of tensions and collusions among agents of the state and between state and non-state actors. However, it is still to some extent obscure with regard to the daily conducts of the state in this land-centred repertoire. Compared with changing policy schemes, micro-level operating mechanisms are less examined, especially those that direct the state's manoeuvre in deploying various discourses for politicaleconomic concerns. In this talk, I focus on the performativity of the state as an alternative perspective to interrogate the entanglement of urban and land transformations in China. Drawing on a case study of Dahongmen, a "key village" on Beijing's urban frontier, this talk foregrounds the power of discourses by decoding the way in which certain statements are uttered to enable certain actions. Embodying the two capacities of doing things and of making repetition, these statements have constituted the more-thaninstitutional foundation of the state's land business while at the same time consolidated a new socio-spatial segregation pattern in Chinese cities.
